

MULTIPLE MEASURE PLACEMENT


Fullerton College Counselors will use multiple measures: 11th through 12th grade high school transcript, test scores (Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB) or California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP), other college transcripts and self-reporting to Assess to determine best placement options in:

- ▶ English (Writing) or English as a Second Language (ESL)
- ▶ Reading
- ▶ Mathematics
 - A higher placement in English, Math and Reading may be possible by showing your second semester of grades of your senior year

ESL & Chemistry Proficiency Test still available. To place directly into CHEM 111AF without completing the prerequisite course, CHEM 107 F, students must take the Chemistry placement test.




READING COURSE SEQUENCE



Studies have shown that students who read at college level achieve a higher grade point average than students who do not. Therefore, it is highly recommended that students consider taking reading courses.




ENGLISH COURSE CHOICES



English 101 provides students with extra support toward success in their college-level English course.




ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE COURSE SEQUENCE

PROMISE STUDENTS RECEIVE

- ▶ Free tuition and waived health fee
- ▶ Early and enhanced registration services
- ▶ One-on-one support services through counseling, coaches, and peer mentors
- ▶ Engagement activities, celebrations, career exploration, and transfer services



PROMISE STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

- ▶ Maintain full-time enrollment of 12+ units per semester (15 units recommended to complete 2 year pathway)
- ▶ Complete a financial aid packet (application & next steps)
- ▶ Meet with a counselor once per semester to review my Student Educational Program Plan (SEPP) and go over my academic, career and transfer goals
- ▶ Maintain a 2.0 or higher GPA and complete at least 67% of attempted units



CAREER EDUCATION

Career Education (formerly called Career Technical Education) refers to classes and programs that provide hands-on training while building the comprehensive skillsets needed for success in the jobs of today and well into the future.

If you took any Career Education classes in high school and/or through R.O.P. (Regional Occupational Program) you may be eligible to receive college credit toward our Career Education programs. Examples of these programs are Accounting, Automotive Technology, Business, Carpentry, Child Development, Construction, Computer Science, Criminal Justice, Photography, and Drafting.

COUNSELING CENTER SERVICES

- ▶ Counseling appointments available throughout the year at the Counseling Center. Non-peak periods include February, March, September and October.
- ▶ General Information (GI) counseling at the Counseling Center (5-10 minutes for quick questions and prerequisite clearances). No appointment needed.

TIPS AND TO DO LIST

- ▶ Fill out your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov
- ▶ You may qualify for California College Promise Grant (CCPG) via your FAFSA which exclusively covers your \$46 per unit cost, student is responsible for all other fees.
- ▶ Locate your registration appointment in MyGateway account, it is also emailed to you by Admissions and Records.
- ▶ Be aware of waitlist procedures as noted in the Schedule of Classes.
- ▶ To avoid being dropped from classes pay your fees IMMEDIATELY.
- ▶ Attend your first class sessions ON TIME to avoid being dropped from the class.
- ▶ It is the student's responsibility to drop classes they do not attend.
- ▶ Prepare for parking challenges the first weeks of the semester by arriving early (1-2 hours early is recommended).
- ▶ Take advantage of services/programs (flyers are available up front).
